

Universitas Gadjah Mada is an Indonesian public ivy league research university located in Yogyakarta, Indonesia, founded on December 19, 1949. Indonesian National Bioethics Commission



National Bioethics Commission (*Komisi Bioetika Nasional*, KBN) was established in September 17, 2004; by joint-three Ministerial Decree of Ministers of Research and Technology, Health and Agriculture. The KBN is aimed to be a place where bioethicists could discuss all matters concerning bioethical issues; and give advise to the Governments and society concerning these issues.

The duty of the KBN is to carry out comprehensive and progressive examination relating to bioethical principles, to give advice to the Government on bioethical aspects of research, development and application of science and technology which based on biological sciences, and to disseminate bioethics comprehensiveness to society at large.

Members of KBN representing academicians (including medical doctors, molecular biologists, geneticists, chemists, biologists, etc), ethicists (bioethicists), religious scholars (from 6 religions which are recognized by the Government, namely Islam, Catholic, Protestant, Buddhism, Hindu and Confucianism), businessmen, educators, and lawyers. KBN is a member of the Asian Bioethics Association (ABA) since 2005.

Asian Bioethics Association



The principles of this Constitution were initially adopted at the Inaugural Meeting of the East Asian Association for Bioethics held in Beijing on the 5th of November, 1995, when the Officers of this Association were also nominated. At the UNESCO Asian Bioethics Conference, 4 Nov, 1997, the Association was broadened to become the Asian Bioethics Association, and several further members were nominated.

The basic objective of the Association is to promote scientific research in bioethics in Asia through open and international exchanges of ideas among those working in bioethics in various fields of study and different regions of the world. In order to achieve this end the Association will encourage the following work and projects: (1) to organize and support international conferences in bioethics in Asia; (2) to assist the development and linkage of regional organizations for bioethics; (3) to encourage other academic and educational work or projects to accomplish their goals consistent with the objectives of the Association.

The Center for Bioethics and Medical Humanities (CBMH) history was started in 1997 as Bioethics and Medical Humanities Teaching Team. The team was aiming to improve moral, ethical, and behavioral aspect of medical students. CBMH was officially established in year 2004, under the decree of The Dean of Faculty of Medicine, Universitas Gadjah Mada (FK-UGM), and is currently promoting, a trans-disciplinary approach.



In its further development, the center has eveloved into an innovative and productive center with main vision “to improve bioethics and medical humanities education, research, and service in order to create highly qualified moral and humane practitioners”. The center aspire to achieve through its missions in the following area:

- Education (integrating bioethics and medical humanities into curriculum)
- Research (establish local, regional, and international research on related issues)
- Service (training and educating professionals and community in related issues)

Aspiring for global participation, the center has made significant efforts to encourage and empower Asia-Pacific Innitiatives in enriching bioethics development in this global society. In line with that spirit, the center has been appointed as the leading coordinator for the International Consortium on Bioethics and Humanities, which houses the Asia-Pacific (Trans-nations) bioethics collaboration (initiator countries are Indonesia, Taiwan, Malaysia, Australia).

Section 2

The Conference

Background

Bioethics since its early development, has been defined as a body of knowledge that bridges values of humanity with development, science and technology. With the intention to emphasise beneficence in the advancement of science and technology, bioethics aims to harmonize and balance these phenomena with humanity, moral values, and the concept of human dignity. The importance of bioethics has never been as pressing as nowadays when more specialized science and technology have been developed, and may at some point, without adequate ethical provision, potentially cause disadvantages, harm and even jeopardize human lives. History has documented that humanities often have been devalued in front of science and technology, and even worse, the environment, human lives and dignity were sacrificed for the sake of research and experimentations. The Nuremberg trial, the Tuskegee tragedy, and many other experimentation, especially related to health, are harsh reminders of how science and technology development can become immoral and inhumane. The development of atomic bombs, biochemical weapons, and many other weapons of mass destruction, only further prove how advanced science and technology have the potential and are capable of destroying human lives and their environments. In these contexts, Bioethics is the love of life and critical in preserving human rights.

In order to achieve those goals, a bioethicist should have an open mind and respect all forms of human knowledge, while also maintaining ethical principles in thinking process. These set of attitudes are in line with the trans-disciplinary concept, inherently embedded in bioethics as a body of knowledge. Bioethics puts emphasis on rationality, comprehensiveness, and open-mindedness in analyzing issues surrounding development. Therefore, it is imperative to infuse and cultivate bioethics values throughout all forms of civic and professional education, at all levels.

In the context of medicine and health, bioethics has grown rapidly that it has become one of the basis to build physicians' and health professionals' competences. Graduates consequently are expected to master the skills of thinking ethically, in order to have the capacity to make moral decision and act accordingly as health professionals, be it in services, research or educational settings. Other field of sciences have also witnessed similar progress of ethics influences, for example ethics in politics, ethics in diplomacy, environmental ethics, ethics in food engineering and business ethics.

The efforts to develop bioethics as an emerging science have drawn experts' attention and contributions from all over the world. Specifically in Asia and the Pacific, the efforts were stimulated in the 1990s through the establishment of Asian Bioethics Association (ABA). This organization was formed to accommodate exchange of ideas between experts, aiming for bioethics integration into various field of sciences and professional expertise. Ever since its first establishment, ABA has regularly hold annual scientific conferences, titled the Asian Bioethics Conference (ABC). Indonesia has had the previous

opportunity to host the ABC9 in 2008 at Jogjakarta, organized by Universitas Islam Negeri Sunan Kalijaga and supported by Indonesian Bioethics Commission (KBN). This year 2016, Indonesia has once again be chosen by acclamation to host ABC17, which will be organized by Universitas Gadjah Mada (UGM) in collaboration with KBN. The Center for Bioethics and Medical Humanities (CBMH) representing UGM has accepted the mandate and is ready to organize and deliver this important event.

Nationally, the efforts to develop bioethics in Indonesia also share similar enthusiastic spirits, with many experts and professionals have begun to understand the importance of bioethics and thus the relentless advocacy. One of the prominent influence comes from the Indonesian Bioethics and Medical Humanities Network (JBHKI), a national organization estsblished in 2000 which has regularly hold biennial national scientific meeting. This year 2016, Faculty of Medicine UGM appointed as Secretary General of JBHKI, has the obligation to host and organize the 8th national meeting.

Both of these major bioethics events, the 8th national meeting of JBHKI and ABC17, will be held in succession, in expectation to optimize participations and contributions from domestic and international bioethics scholars in both events to come up with real policy suggestions based on evidence in many countries.
