

Earthquake History


- 1988 Earthquake Killed 721 People and Damaged a large number of buildings
- There was bigger destruction by an earthquake in 1934 (millions of people lost houses, no official death toll)
- In 2012 earthquake took the life of 2 people
- Recently there was earthquake 6 on the Richter scale (Focal point in China).

Risk Assessment

- Collection and collation of available existing data
- Kick-off meeting to introduce the project to the community
- Hazard assessment
- Vulnerability assessment
- Damage estimation (theoretical)
- Damage estimation (non-theoretical) using interviews
- Preparation of the earthquake scenario
- Implementation of the scenario workshop
- Dissemination of the earthquake scenario
